

The bulk of this collection consists of images that are copies from collections at the Silver City Museum. For these collections (Harlan Collection, William Allen Collection, Silver City-Grant County Chamber of Commerce Collection, Historical Society Collection, and the Lillian Forsythe Collection), the Silver City Museum retains the copyright. Some of the images are copies from collections at the Miller Library at Western New Mexico University. The Miller Library retains the copyright for these images. There are a few photos that are unique to the library. Both the Silver City Museum and the Miller Library have more images than the copies found in this collection.

Most of the images have information on the back. That information is included in this finding aid. The sources for this information is unknown. Some of this information is from the original owners of the images. Some of this information was created by a former library/museum staff or volunteer.

This collection is nominally organized into three areas: people, places, and subjects. There is overlap across these areas. The collection is held in the library's treasure room. To access the collection, one must get library staff assistance.

A Tribute to Harold Johnson. During my ministry of nearly thirty years I have had the occasion to preside at the burial of many people, good, bad, and indifferent, and because of the fact that these services occur so often on finds himself in a position of being able to be fairly objective and devoid of maudlin sentimentality. However, when the word came that Harold Johnson, without going into phrases of adulation? It was his faith that saw the possibilities of a camp where youth might come and work and worship in an environment that of itself spoke of God's wondrous handiwork in his world. And finally it was his faith that enabled him to stand firm even though he knew his end was approaching. The rifle was usually a 30-30 and the pistol a Frontier Model Colt .45. The slicker tied to the back of the saddle was usually yellow. The quirt was like those used by the cowboys for many years. The neckerchief was usually a red or blue bandanna.

- Silver City
 - 1. Milby cabin on the corner of Spring and Main Streets. In the spring of 1869, William Milby, John Bullard, and others came from Pinos Altos and filed preemption claims on 320 acres in a beautiful little valley called "La Cienega de San Vicente." They soon had land under cultivation, finding a ready market for their produce at Pinos Altos. The following year silver was discovered on the hill behind the present day courthouse. As soon as the news was out, men rushed to the "Cienega" mines from all over the territory. Tents, brush shelters, and cabins of log, rock and adobe dotted the valley which was soon given the elegant name of "Silver City."
 - 2. Carrasco Hacienda on the south end of Bullard Street. The Carrasco family, with others from Mexico, arrived in Silver City soon after news of the discovery of silver in the area. They soon located claims, erected arastras, (small adobe furnaces for smelting ore), and turned out the first silver bullion produced in the camp. In less than two years, Carrasco had treated some 300 tons of ore and produced about \$200,000 in bullion by these primitive methods.
 - 3. Martin Bremen residence and lumber yard on Bullard Street between Bremen Street and San Vicente Street. Form his sawmill north of Pinos Altos, Bremen supplied most of the lumber used in Silver City's early houses and mills.
 - 4. In 1871, Bremen built the first stamp mill in the camp, using parts of two old stamp mills from Pinos Altos for crushing ore and eight wooden barrels for amalgamation. From this small beginning, Bremen became one of the most prominent mining men in the territory.
 - 5. Antrim Cabin where Billy the Kid lived in 1873. Catharine Antrim, Billy's mother, died in 1874 and soon after that Billy got into trouble by stealing \$70.00 from a Chinaman in Georgetown. He was arrested and jailed in Silver City, but escaped by climbing up the chimney. Contrary to popular legend, he did not kill his first man in Silver City.
 - 6. Grant County Courthouse located on the east side of Hudson Street between Market and Yankie Streets was built to house Grant County officials after the county seat was transferred from Pinos Altos to Silver City in December 1871. To the rear was the adobe jail where Billy the Kid was incarcerated.

In 1901 Mrs. Elizabeth Warren acquired the property, which she renamed the San Vicente. Organized under medical supervision, it served as a sanitarium as wells a hotel. • The native copper, found in abundance, was worked by the crude mining methods available at that time. The ore was extracted with heavy iron picks and gathered into large rawhide bags. The laborers carried 150 to 200 pound loads of ore strapped over their shoulders, climbing to the surface by means of notched beams called "chicken ladders". Water was bailed out in rawhide buckets with the top kept open by a bar of copper bent to form a ring and riveted to the hide. The ore was so pure that it had only to be melted in a small adobe furnace and cast in rough stone molds. The copper ingots were transported by mule train under military escort to Chihuahua and Mexico City, where it was sued chiefly for coinage.

Ranching, Lyons- Campbell Ranch (9 images)

- Tom Lyons was the real developer of the Gila Hot Springs, using money imported from the East. His frequent trips to New York resulted in a continuing flow of capital to fulfill his dreams for the big ranch. The grandest dream of all was the famous Lyons Hunting Lodge set far back in the wilderness, a spot which is still not readily accessible. Pack horses carried in all materials for the building as well as the furnishing which graced the house, including a grand piano for his wife. Built in the shape of and E it was immense. The thick adobe walls provided insulation from heat and cold and the patio, situation on the north side, was cooled with winds from the Mogollon Mountains seen in the distance.
